To become a healthcare assistant:

You can get a job as healthcare assistant without training. Once you are in the job, then you will often be given the option to gain a Certificate in Healthcare. A first aid certificate and training in CPR is an advantage.



Numerous agencies provide Certificate courses in Healthcare Assistance or Community Support. They take 12 to 34 weeks to complete. Most certificates are gained whilst on the job.

As an example, Toi Ohomai Polytechnic has a one semester NZ Certificate in Health and Wellbeing.

If you are interested in this area and still at school, Toi Ohomai also provides a Level 3 course called National Certificate in Health, Disability, and Aged Support.

Healthcare Assistants

Healthcare assistants are also called caregivers, carers or support or community workers. Their work involves caring for people who need support with their daily living activities and needs. This may range from helping an elderly or disabled person to dress and wash, to helping a recovering stroke patient to re-establish normal physical and cognitive activities in a rehabilitation unit or at home.



Healthcare assistants are supervised by other health professionals to support patients in hospitals or people requiring support in rest homes or the community.

What do they do?

Healthcare assistants may do some or all of the following:

- support patients with daily dressing and personal grooming
- help with showering
- help with rehabilitation tasks such as walking and social interaction
- cleaning and tidying
- make beds
- look after medical equipment
- help with eating
- prepare meals
- serve meals



Chance of getting a job

The chances of getting a job as a healthcare assistant are high. This is due to an aging population who are living longer and often require care to maintain their daily life.

Where do healthcare assistants work?

Healthcare assistants work in rehabilitation units, aged-care facilities or in the community.
